

Ari Hoffman is an Associate Professor of Clinical Medicine in the Division of Hospital Medicine (DHM) at UCSF. He joined the faculty in 2014 as a clinician-educator, and works on the inpatient services at Moffitt-Long Hospital. He is also the Value Improvement Director for DHM and the Medical Director of Hospital Medicine at St. Mary's Medical Center. He has been affiliated faculty with IHPS since 2018 with a focus on teaching costs of care, healthcare value, and health policy.

Krista completed undergraduate training in English and Biology at Williams College and PhD in Bioethics, Health Policy & Management at Johns Hopkins Bloomberg School of Public Health. She previously contributed to national program evaluations at Mathematica Policy Research and served as Director of Research and Education at Capital Caring, a large community-based non-profit hospice and palliative care provider serving the Washington DC metropolitan area. Krista moved west for an aging research T32 fellowship at UCSF in 2015, expecting to move back east 2 years later. Instead, she joined faculty in 2017 and lives on a houseboat in Sausalito with a spouse, 4yo son, dog, cat, sailboat, kayak and 10 bicycles. She completed the CTSI implementation science certificate and was an Atlantic Fellows for Equity in Brain Health at the UCSF site of the Global Brain Health Institute. Krista has been affiliated faculty in IHPS since 2018 and works closely with the Medical Cultures Lab on applied clinical research using qualitative methods. Within the Division of Geriatrics. Krista also serves as Associate Director of the T32 Aging Research Program, Associate **Director of Analytic Research Operations, and Division Wellness** Officer. She's thru-hiked the John Muir Trail and 400 miles of the Appalachian Trail, and if pandemics and fire season allow, she'll bring her son backpacking this summer.

Ari received his bachelor's degree at Stanford and his MD from UCSF. He has taken every opportunity to hit the pause button on traditional training: he worked as a translational bench researcher with the Pacific Vascular Research Lab at UCSF, a pre-doctoral Bioethics fellow at the NIH where he studied the use of comparative effectiveness research as a tool for reducing waste in healthcare spending, and as an intern with the Center for Medical Technology Policy in Baltimore. Many of these opportunities are a direct result of mentorship from IHPS faculty. Before joining the faculty at UCSF. he spent a year as adjunct clinical faculty at a large public referral hospital in southwest Uganda as part of the Global Health Service Partnership, a public-private partnership between Peace Corps Response and Seed Global Health. Ari's professional passions include the pursuit of the highest value healthcare for everyone. clinical and policy education, and policy implementation at the health system level.
